"Sing a new song to the Lord" Psalm 96:1 by Kathy Keeley

Attending a recent arts showcase I was struck by the number of choirs there are locally. They seem to cater for every taste from classical to musical to folk to contemporary. Singing is an important part of our church service. In a Song of Thanksgiving Psalm 67:4 reads, "May the nations be glad and sing for joy because you judge the people with justice and guide every nation on earth."

In our hymn books there are many songs written which voice concerns. Even those who don't particularly like singing may feel a link to a kindred spirit in the words of a song or hymn. If we know and understand the words, through singing or listening to a hymn we can share an awareness of the feelings behind it and sometimes a motivation to address the issues it highlights:

"...Whom shall I send? Here I am Lord. Is it I Lord. I have heard you calling in the night. I will go Lord, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart." (Songs of Fellowship, I the Lord of Sea and Sky)

Singing is often accompanied by instruments and we are fortunate enough to have some very good musicians in our church. In Samuel 6:5 when the covenant box is brought to Jerusalem, "They were playing harps, lyres, drums, rattles and cymbals." Words alone doesn't always convey what music can.

MHA 75th Anniversary Service of Thanksgiving

MHA is celebrating its 75th anniversary during 2018. The President of Conference, the Rev'd Michaela Youngson, will be the preacher at the 75th MHA Anniversary Service in Derby Cathedral on Saturday 13 October, starting at 3pm.

Early Church - A Change in the Air by Graham Seaton

Early Church has just turned 14. It's a teenager - and like any teenager it needs to finds its way in the grown up world. But what does that mean?

First let's take a step back. What is Early Church? Various phrases come to mind – a family friendly service; a young and growing congregation; an important part of the greater Trinity family; a sometimes noisy, but always engaging act of worship; a twice monthly opportunity to bring Christ to people who otherwise might not enter our church ... I could go on. It's been a success story for Trinity. Unlike many churches in the Circuit, we have a growing number of children and young people worshiping with us. I know some feel that the 10:30 service has suffered – the comment I have heard is that Early Church has taken the children. But let's get real. If the 10:30 appealed to the young families they would be attending at 10:30. Early Church has been designed to appeal to young families in a way the 10:30 doesn't. So let's celebrate that we have one church that offers two different styles of worship.

So here we are - Early Church is into its teenage years and that is a period of great change. But why change? Many see Early Church as "their" church. For some it's their only experience of church. And as such twice a month really isn't enough. If Early Church is "their" church then we need to offer a full service (excuse the pun!).

So from the start of Advent – that's 2nd December – Early Church is going to run weekly. We'll still start at 9:15. There will be a 20 – 30 minute period of family friendly worship with the introduction to our theme. Then we'll break into groups to develop the theme (3 groups to start with – children, older young people and adults). After that we'll all go down to the Chatteris Suite for Coffee&. We hope to keep the same energy and fun overall but with a little more teaching and reflection.

Come and join us! And if it's not your style – please pray with us that Early Church will continue to bring Christ into the lives of those who attend.

Joint Public Issues Initiative by Charles Horsefield

Just over a year ago I was asked to look at how the Circuit might provide information on "public issues". I don't think this was because anyone thought we were inactive in this area in our Circuit. Methodist churches generally are among the most socially conscious and active bodies in their communities and South Beds churches are no exception. I think it was more the case that individual churches might want to know what is going on elsewhere so they could build upon or emulate it.

The best way forward seemed to be to pilot something with the Trinity web-site because we were already using it to provide information on what was available for homeless people in Leighton Buzzard. In fact ours had been the only site doing this for several years and it had kept the church office quite busy dealing with enquiries and offers of help. Last year the Leighton-Linslade Homeless Service got their own web-site going and so now we only have to cover our own Wednesday Night Drop-In and direct enquiries about the Emergency Night Shelter and other services to their site.

We had from time-to-time covered other local issues on the Trinity site but had not drawn attention to public issues of more general interest. Then I found that the Methodist Church had formed a Joint Public Issues Team with the Baptists, the URC and the Church of Scotland - and that they produce a monthly newsletter entitled "Praxis", which they would send to me for wider circulation. The content would typically be a mixture of Public Policy Statements from the churches (there was one from the Methodist Church on "Poverty" in the June issue); prayers about social issues; reports on government initiatives and promotion of resources for youth work and other work in communities. One recent article covered the government policy of creating a hostile environment for immigrants. Another covered the implications of Brexit for social mobility.
